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COLD OPEN

INT. GENERIC OFFICE - DAY

JANET (V.O.) Working in customer service, you deal with a lot of needy, demanding people. I usually handle the most difficult ones. I'm good at it.

In a drab cubicle, JANET ZHAO (29) talks on a headset. She's confident and capable but has the put-upon attitude of someone who always ends up doing all the work on a group project. Juuust enough make-up and style to look presentable.

QUICK CUTS of Janet talking to co-workers and on the phone.

JANET I'll handle it. / Send them over to me. / I'm on it. / Another one? OK. (on the phone) Yes, I've filed a claim for your refund already. No, you have to wait for it to be processed.

JANET (V.O.) And it's because I've spent my whole life dealing with the worst customers ever: my family.

JANET Dad, there's nothing else I can do, okay? Just wait the ten days. Bye.

As Janet hangs up, her angry MANAGER stomps over.

MANAGER Janet "Zow"! You've been warned multiple times about extended personal calls during work hours.

JANET Sorry, I was helping my dad get a refund for a juicer he broke.

MANAGER So it wasn't a life or death emergency.

JANET My parents generally can't seem to differentiate between an emergency and a favor. (MORE) JANET (CONT'D) And my last name is pronounced "Jow," by the way.

MANAGER Then why is it spelled with a Z?

JANET

Because it's a different language.

MANAGER

Your family is not paying you, we are. Do the job you're being paid to do. And speaking of, I just got word you didn't get the position on the product development team.

JANET

What? But I've basically been doing all the work for that department for months now!

MANAGER

Yeah, so why would they promote you if you already do the work for them? Focus on keeping *this* job because the constant phone calls with your family have to stop or...

As Janet nods along -- we get the sense she's used to being lectured -- her cell phone starts to buzz on her desk. She glances over and sees "MOM" calling. The Manager clocks this.

MANAGER (CONT'D) Janet Z. Do not answer that.

JANET If I don't, she'll keep calling.

And then possibly call the police.

Janet glances at the phone. The buzzing seems more urgent.

MANAGER

I'm warning you. I will write you--

Janet answers the call.

JANET

Hello, Mom?

MANAGER You're getting written up!

But Janet is no longer listening; she's fully engrossed in her call. The Manager storms off.

JANET (V.O.) This conversation is all in Mandarin. Here's a helpful indicator whenever people are speaking Chinese.

*Throughout the show, a VISUAL CUE (TBD) will indicate whenever characters are speaking in Mandarin, but we will hear it as perfect, unaccented English.

> KATHY (O.C.) (thru phone) How do you spell "funeral?"

JANET This is why you called me? I'm at work! You got me in trouble!

KATHY (O.C.) Is it so hard for you to help your own mother? Your flesh and blood!

JANET Okay! It's f-u-n-e-r-a-l. Why do you need to know?

KATHY (O.C.) I'm writing a note to the bottled water delivery man.

JANET Why do you need to spell "funeral" to the bottled water delivery man?

KATHY (O.C.) Grandma died. Meet at her house tomorrow for the will reading.

JANET

Oh my God. Grandma... Isn't it a little insensitive to have the will reading the very next day?

KATHY (O.C.) No, Grandma died three days ago.

JANET Three days ago!? Why didn't you tell me until now?

KATHY (O.C.) I don't want to bother you at work!

END OF COLD OPEN

ACT ONE

EXT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - DAY

Janet's economy car pulls up to a San Marino mansion.

JANET (V.O.) Grandma Zhao was a self-made woman.

INSERT - oil painting of younger Grandma Zhao

JANET (V.O.) After the untimely death of her husband, she moved here, to the country that all of her adult children had immigrated to.

INSERT - oil painting of Grandma arriving at a US airport.

JANET (V.O.) And immediately became more successful than any of them.

INSERT - oil painting of Grandma looking like a powerful businesswoman at a mahogany desk.

JANET (V.O.) She also developed a love for oil paintings.

INSERT - oil painting of Grandma looking at the previous oil painting of herself.

JANET (V.O.) And that's about all I really knew about her. Like with most Asian grandparents, we saw each other regularly, but we didn't talk much.

AT THE FRONT DOOR

Janet takes a moment to psyche herself up, exhaling sharply like she's about to jump in a freezing cold pool. She enters.

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - FOYER - DAY

The house is stately and well-maintained. Cherrywood furniture, brocade, and lots of portraits of Grandma Zhao.

Janet enters and changes into house slippers as her mom KATHY (60) comes to greet her. Kathy is ever slightly overdressed.

JANET Hi, Mom. How are you--

KATHY (tsks) You couldn't lose some weight before you see all your aunties and cousins?

JANET Well, I didn't know Grandma was going to die and we would all gather together at her house. I'll try to anticipate it next time.

JANET (V.O.) This is my mom Kathy. She has always said marrying my dad and having me prevented her from achieving her Five Dreams in Life. They range from superstar singer--

INT. BIRTHDAY PARTY - NIGHT

It's young Janet's birthday and everyone is gathered to sing.

KATHY (high operatic soprano) HAPPY BIRTHDAY TO YOU!

INT. PARENTS' HOUSE - NIGHT

JANET (V.O.) To fancy lady lawyer...

Kathy watches a legal drama on TV.

KATHY I could do that.

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - BACK TO SCENE

JANET (V.O.) To rich housewife.

Janet and Kathy enter the living room, where the rest of the family are gathered eating cut fruit and drinking tea.

JANET (V.O.) Which I guess she technically was prevented from by marrying... ROBERT (60) gives Janet a hearty pat on the shoulder.

ROBERT Janet. Did you eat?

JANET (V.O.) My dad Robert, a man with an endless well of business ideas-all of them terrible.

JANET How are you doing? Are you okay?

ROBERT Janet, listen...

He looks serious, inhaling deeply. Janet is panicked.

JANET (V.O.) Oh God, stoic Asian dad isn't supposed to get emotional!

ROBERT I figured out how to take my restaurant to the next level!

JANET (V.O.) I should not have doubted his ability to hide his grief.

INT. GERALD'S CAFE - DAY

JANET (V.O.) My dad runs a small deli. When he bought it, he kept the original name, leading to much confusion.

Robert works the counter. A huge sign says "Gerald's Cafe." At a table, a customer tries to get Robert's attention.

CUSTOMER Hey Gerald? Gerald! Gerald!

But Robert doesn't respond since it's not his name.

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - LIVING ROOM - BACK TO SCENE

ROBERT I'm putting in leather booths, so it'll be just like a steakhouse. JANET

Leather booths. In a deli. That only has five tables as it is.

JANET (V.O.) See? Terrible ideas.

JANET That seems like a waste of money.

ROBERT No no no-- ugh, you don't understand the restaurant business.

Kathy pulls Janet away.

KATHY Janet, do you have a boyfriend yet?

JANET Since I talked to you yesterday? No.

KATHY How about work? Any promotions? Give me something to work with!

JANET (V.O.) My mom is worried she has no ammunition in the ancient Chinese mom art of Comparing Children. Her main opponents are--

They're approached by AUNTIE AMY (60s).

JANET Auntie Amy.

AUNTIE AMY

Janet.

They stand, not making any physical contact.

JANET (V.O.) We don't hug in our family. Even if we did I'd probably still avoid it.

Auntie Amy squeezes Janet's upper arms.

AUNTIE AMY Still eating hamburgers everyday?

JANET I don't really eat hamburgers ever.

AUNTIE AMY

Well, you shouldn't if you're going to lose weight. Are you at the same job? Answering calls from people complaining about their toasters?

JANET Funny how I'm very good at listening to rude people say mean things to me all day.

JANET (V.O.) Auntie Amy, much to my mother's envy, is a rich housewife.

INT. AUNTIE AMY'S BEDROOM - DAY

Auntie Amy lies in bed flipping through a catalog.

JANET (V.O.) Her husband is a high-powered executive who works overseas so she combats her boredom with hoarding--

WIDEN to see the other side of the bed is stacked high with the spoils of many shopping sprees.

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - LIVING ROOM - BACK TO SCENE

JANET (V.O.) --and honing in on everyone's weaknesses. Like a shark in Skechers Shape-ups.

Auntie Amy conspiratorially whispers to Janet.

AUNTIE AMY Poor Auntie Linda is so embarrassed that your cousin Franklin still hasn't found a job. Now you're not the only one with no direction.

AUNTIE LINDA (50s) approaches Janet.

AUNTIE LINDA Janet, any plans to go back to school? I'm sure at this point your parents would be happy to see you graduate with *any* degree. Even art!

She laughs at her own non-joke.

JANET (V.O.) Auntie Linda, my mom's other rival, teaches at a university.

INSERT - photo of Auntie Linda's faculty photo with the caption: "WE ACADEMICS ARE ABOVE PERSONAL QUOTES."

JANET (V.O.)

She sucks.

AUNTIE LINDA I'm concerned about you. I know it's hard for lazy people to have willpower, but you should know it's so unhealthy to eat hamburgers everyday.

JANET Why does everyone think I eat hamburgers everyday?

INT. PARENTS' HOUSE - DAY

Robert sits with Auntie Linda and Auntie Amy.

ROBERT You know how these American kids are, Janet eats hamburgers every day and nothing else.

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - LIVING ROOM - BACK TO SCENE

KATHY Janet's starting to exercise more. She can do push-ups!

JANET I don't want to demonstrate!

AUNTIE LINDA Franklin can do a one-arm push-up. (Yelling across room) FRANKLIN, COME SHOW YOUR AUNTIE A ONE-ARM PUSH-UP!

COUSIN FRANKLIN (27) hurries over. He's eager to please but he also looks like being there causes him physical pain. He dives to the floor and does a shaky one-arm push-up. Auntie Linda smiles, triumphant. Kathy fumes.

AUNTIE LINDA (CONT'D)

(to Janet and Franklin) Have you two said hello yet? I think the last time you saw each other was Franklin's graduation from <u>law school</u>. As a lawyer.

FRANKLIN

Hi, Janet. How are you? I'm doing okay. I'm also looking for a place to live if you have any leads.

JANET I didn't know you were moving back for good. What's your budget?

FRANKLIN That depends on several factors that I can't answer right now.

JANET (V.O.) Last year, Franklin graduated from a prestigious law school.

INSERT - photo studio portrait of Franklin holding his framed diploma. As in <u>he went to a portrait studio to get this done</u>.

JANET (V.O.) But at the bottom of his class. His unemployment is a huge source of embarrassment for his mom so she compensates by saying things like--

Auntie Linda announces loudly to the whole room--

AUNTIE LINDA I don't understand why we pay a lawyer to read the will when we have a lawyer here in the family.

FRANKLIN Technically, I'm not a practicing lawyer, more of a hypothetical lawyer.

AUNTIE LINDA That'll change once you get the money to start your own law firm.

JANET (V.O.) Gee, I wonder what money she could be talking about. At Grandma's will reading. FRANKLIN Yup, and then you won't pressure me to do stuff anymore, right?

JANET Franklin. Are you new to being Asian? The pressure never ends.

AUNTIE LINDA The important thing is that you're a lawyer who went to college and not one of those lazy kids with bad mothers.

JANET (V.O.) Obviously, she's talking about me and my mom.

KATHY (to Janet) I think she's talking about you and me.

JANET KATHY (CONT'D) She's always picking on me. She's always picking on me.

Robert joins them.

ROBERT

Hey, is it just me or does it *almost* feel like she's talking about someone specific?

KATHY She's worried she won't get as much as you and Amy since Amy is the oldest and you're the only son.

ROBERT No, my mother didn't play favorites. Although she did rank us regularly...

ACROSS THE ROOM, Auntie Linda is glaring at Kathy and talking to Franklin.

AUNTIE LINDA She's worried Janet won't get as much as you and Winnie since Winnie is the oldest grandchild and you're the only grandson. Don't you worry, Franklin, my mother always made very shrewd decisions. FRANKLIN She never let me sit on the living room furniture. Do I still have to follow that rule?

COUSIN WINNIE (30's), an Asian Gwyneth Paltrow, glides into the room carrying multiple travel bags.

WINNIE Hello, everyone! I'm here!

JANET (V.O.) That is my cousin Winnie.

WINNIE I was just at the most restorative eco-retreat in the Amazon.

JANET (V.O.) She is insufferable.

EXT. GRADUATION CEREMONY - DAY

Winnie, in graduate robes, receives her masters degree.

JANET (V.O.) Winnie has numerous degrees, from business to photography. However, every time she gets a new degree--

Auntie Amy hands Winnie congratulatory flowers.

AUNTIE AMY What is your plan for job hunting?

WINNIE I changed my mind. I want to do something else.

JANET (V.O.) And then her dad pays for her to go back to school. This has allowed her to never actually work.

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - LIVING ROOM - BACK TO SCENE

KATHY (low to Janet) I heard her father is cutting her off. Not even money for schooling.

AUNTIE LINDA

(butting in) How can anyone put a limit on education? It's the noblest pursuit.

JANET

Well, weirdly, if you go to school for decades and never get a job, then it's kinda just an expensive full-time hobby.

Winnie passes out tins of tea.

WINNIE I brought gifts for you all!

JANET (V.O.) More like the last of her allowance brought gifts for us all, but okay.

WINNIE This tea applies the principles of food poisoning to detoxing.

JANET So it's going to give us diarrhea?

WINNIE

Exactly. I read a really interesting email forward the other day about how we can use the power of food poisoning to our benefit.

JANET (V.O.) She's like this all the time.

Winnie looks at a portrait of Grandma.

WINNIE Grandma always gave the best gifts.

JANET

She always gave cash.

WINNIE I think she knew it was my favorite.

The DOORBELL RINGS.

AUNTIE AMY The lawyer's here!

JANET Let's get this painful gathering over with already.

FRANKLIN Dealing with Grandma's death.

JANET Yeah, that too.

KATHY (sidling up to Winnie) How *much* weight can I lose with this diarrhea tea?

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - LIVING ROOM - LATER

Everyone listens as the FAMILY LAWYER reads Grandma's will.

FAMILY LAWYER I, Betty LiuZhu Zhao, hereby bequeath my entire estate and appoint sole executorship to my granddaughter, Janet Zhao.

EVERYONE What?! / Janet? / JANET??

JANET (V.O.)

Huh?

The fruit Janet was eating falls out of her mouth.

JANET

Huh?

FRANKLIN Did anyone else know that was Grandma's full name?

END OF ACT ONE

ACT TWO

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - LIVING ROOM - BACK TO SCENE

ROBERT Everything goes to Janet? Is that what he said?

AUNTIE LINDA But she doesn't even have a college degree!

AUNTIE AMY She hasn't made anything of herself, how can she be expected to fill our mother's shoes?

WINNIE Do we know for certain Grandma had not gone insane when she wrote that?

KATHY Janet, we need to start investing right away. Maybe real estate -- no, gold -- no, something on your phone.

Janet is a little dazed. This is all surreal.

JANET (V.O.) My first thought was--

FANTASY

EXT. BEAUTIFUL POOLSIDE LOCALE - DAY

Janet is lounging by the pool, looking more happy and relaxed than we've ever seen her. A SERVANT brings her a beverage.

SERVANT Your hostile takeover of your former employer is complete. You are now the head of every department. Are you pleased?

JANET I'm mentally, emotionally, and spiritually-- even though I hate that word-- well.

Her phone rings. "FAMILY" calling. She tosses it in the pool.

JANET (CONT'D) No. I have boundaries now.

END FANTASY

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - LIVING ROOM - BACK TO SCENE

Janet grins from ear too ear. She catches herself.

JANET Does it say why? I mean, why would she give everything to just me?

AUNTIE AMY Dementia. AUNTIE LINDA Brain tumor.

FAMILY LAWYER Uh... no, the will does not list her reasoning. There isn't a section for that.

FRANKLIN Keep reading. What do the rest of us get?

AUNTIE LINDA We get nothing! How final is this?

FAMILY LAWYER It's... very final. I don't think your mother will be making any more revisions to it. Everything she owned will belong to Janet.

Everyone looks to Janet.

WINNIE Just to be clear, Grandma was *not* insane?

INT. CONFERENCE ROOM - DAY

JANET (V.O.) Over the next couple days, I got everything.

Janet sits at the conference table, surrounded by LAWYERS. Long beat of Janet silently signing endless documents.

> JANET (V.O.) Which was a lot less exciting than I thought it would be.

INT. GENERIC OFFICE - NEXT DAY

JANET (V.O.) I quit my job.

Janet goes to her cubicle and looks around.

JANET (V.O.) I realized I didn't have any personal items to pack up. So I took a bunch of pens and post-its.

She pockets a bunch of pens and post-it pads, then thinks twice and puts it all back.

JANET (V.O.) Then I remembered I had money now and put everything back.

She takes the pens again.

JANET (V.O.) Everybody likes free pens.

INT. JANET'S APARTMENT - NIGHT

JANET (V.O.) Then I went on a big shopping spree.

Janet sits on her couch, tapping away at her laptop. It's not dissimilar to the document signing.

JANET (V.O.) Which looks a lot less exciting than I thought it would.

EXT. 168 IMPORTS - DAY

JANET (V.O.) I went to check out the company that I now owned.

Janet arrives at an unremarkable strip mall. It's the same strip mall that contains Gerald's Cafe.

INT. 168 IMPORTS - CONTINUOUS

The office is a mishmash of cheap office furniture, super 80s furniture that somehow looks brand new, expensive gold/jade decor, an ancient beige fax machine, and endless clutter.

Janet enters and surveys the land, taking it all in. Grandma's office assistant GENE pops up.

Hello hello? JANET Hi, I'm Janet Zhao. I inherited this company from my Grandma.

GENE

GENE Oh, right! The death. I'm sorry and congratulations. I'm Gene, I manage the office here.

JANET So what exactly is it that this company does?

GENE A lot of things but mostly we make money.

JANET Not helpful...

CUT TO:

INT. SHOWROOM - MOMENTS LATER

Gene shows Janet samples of fake money, novelty money-themed merchandise, play money, etc.

JANET Oh. We actually make money.

INT. GRANDMA'S OFFICE - LATER

Janet sits at the desk while Gene stands by.

JANET So I sit here and... do whatever I want?

GENE As long as you make money.

JANET Okay, we covered that. I get it now. It was confusingly phrased.

Janet slowly turns in her chair, savoring the feeling.

JANET (CONT'D) Finally, I get to be in charge instead of always doing other people's work for them.

AUNTIE AMY and AUNTIE LINDA enter.

AUNTIE AMY Janet, we need to discuss the funeral arrangements.

JANET (V.O.) This is the kind of moment where an American family would support each other through their grief.

AUNTIE AMY This funeral has to be better than when the Chens lost their mother.

JANET (V.O.)

Not us.

JANET Right, because everything is a competition.

AUNTIE AMY

Everything has to be perfect so Auntie Linda and I will prepare speeches for each family member.

JANET Shouldn't everyone say what they want to say?

AUNTIE AMY

AUNTIE LINDA

No!

AUNTIE AMY

NO!

This isn't one of those American funerals where people tell jokes and give toasts!

JANET

Are you sure you're not thinking of a wedding?

AUNTIE LINDA Janet, you never take things

seriously. And this funeral is serious business so let the grownups handle it. But a funeral is for family to remember and honor their loved one.

AUNTIE AMY See? Wrong. A funeral is a checklist of things you have to do properly so that people like the Chens don't look down on you.

JANET

Well, I'm going to give a eulogy that I write myself and there's nothing you can say to stop me.

AUNTIE AMY

So immature.

AUNTIE LINDA Just like her mom.

AUNTIE AMY We will decide how the rest of the funeral goes.

JANET Well, make sure there's a prime slot for my heartfelt eulogy. Stock up on tissue. Buy stock in tissue!

The Aunties leave. Gene looks to Janet.

GENE I didn't know you were so close with your Grandma.

JANET (head in hands) I don't know anything about her.

Kathy barges in.

KATHY EXCUSE ME, MOTHER OF THE CEO COMING THROUGH!

JANET Mom, what are you doing here?

KATHY I work for this company.

JANET

GENE

You do?

*

You do?

Gene mouths to Janet, "I've never seen her before."

KATHY

I don't always have time to come in because of my many social obligations. (then) I'm here to see my chubby little CEO run her very own company. First thing-- you need a water feature in the front for people to see when they walk in. It shows you're successful enough to afford a water feature and have good taste.

JANET Are there a lot of walk-ins here?

KATHY

Also, water feature in the bathroom. And definitely a water feature in here.

MOMENTS LATER

Janet is talking on the phone to the Family Lawyer.

JANET My mom is trying to run things here. Is there some sort of "stay away from the company" contract we can trick her into signing?

FAMILY LAWYER She has no legal authority. You own the company. You could just tell her to stay away.

JANET (beat) Okay, that means nothing to my mom, or anyone else in my family.

Janet looks at Kathy, who is already measuring out Grandma's office, presumably for a water feature.

JANET (CONT'D) What I need is to distract her, like deflecting a laser to destroy something else.

FAMILY LAWYER Is this something that requires the services of a lawyer? JANET No. I know what to do.

She hangs up.

JANET (CONT'D) (whisper to self) Five Dreams in Life.

We briefly FLASHBACK to Kathy's singing dream.

INT. GRANDMA'S OFFICE - MOMENTS LATER

Kathy and Janet sits across from each other.

JANET Mom, I know you've always wanted to take voice lessons. I could pay for-

Kathy immediately gets up.

KATHY I already know the voice coach I want to use.

INT. AMY'S HOUSE - GUEST BEDROOM - DAY

JANET (V.O.) Meanwhile, at Auntie Amy's house, Winnie was trying to revive a former source of income.

Other than a twin bed, the room is filled to the brim with boxes and bags. Winnie paces around (as best as she can) while talking on the phone.

WINNIE

Well Dad, you could just *un*-cut me off. After all, I'm agreeing with you now-- photography isn't a stable career path. So why are you punishing me for not wanting to be a photographer anymore? Do you really want to be the father who denies his own daughter a degree in jewelry design? In her creative prime? Hello? Dad? INT. AUNTIE LINDA'S HOUSE - DAY

Franklin paces by the front door. He jumps at the sound of the mail slot creaking and snatches away the day's mail, thumbing through it furiously. He tears open a collection notice for his student loans and one for his credit card.

> JANET (V.O.) Franklin was drowning in debt but didn't want anyone to know. Living with his mom meant constantly getting rid of evidence.

LIVING ROOM

Franklin brings the mail to the fireplace, but can't work it.

FRANKLIN Mom! How do I use the fireplace?

AUNTIE LINDA (O.S.) Just wear a sweater!

INT. GERALD'S CAFE - DAY

Robert pours over pictures of leather booths.

JANET (V.O.) My dad obsessed over making his deli more like a steakhouse.

Customers finish eating and leave.

CUSTOMER See ya, Gerald!

Robert is visibly annoyed at being called Gerald again.

INT. VOICE COACH'S STUDIO - DAY

A VOICE COACH sits at a piano. Kathy stands, hands clasped, singing along. She finishes the last note.

JANET (V.O.) And my mom had her very first voice lesson.

KATHY I'm ready to perform for an audience. Janet is going through the piles of stuff in Grandma's office. Gene is helping.

GENE

How do you know so little about your grandma when you saw her so regularly?

JANET

None of us really talked to her. She was this kinda intimidating lady we had nothing in common with. I didn't even know her first name until I heard it in the will.

GENE

Then what are you gonna say in your eulogy? You really talked it up.

JANET

I know, Gene. I'm gonna keep going through all her stuff until I learn enough to write a speech that honors her and shames my aunties.

GENE What do you have so far?

JANET

She kept a lot of receipts. And liked gold. I have nothing, Gene!

Kathy enters, wearing a t-shirt printed with a photo of Janet sitting at Grandma's desk with "CEO" written across it.

KATHY Janet, I need to talk to you about the funeral.

JANET When did you get that shirt made?

KATHY I want to perform a song at the funeral. I can be the big finale.

JANET Isn't the big finale burying Grandma? No, I just told you, I'm the big finale.

AUNTIE AMY (O.S.) AUNTIE LINDA (O.S.) Absolutely not. Oh God, no!

The Aunties enter.

AUNTIE AMY We are absolutely not going to have that at our funeral.

KATHY <u>My daughter</u> Janet is the CEO.

JANET (V.O.) My mom could finally brag about me. It was nice. For about a second.

KATHY

And she and I will make the major decisions in this family. And then she makes them happen.

AUNTIE LINDA

Janet, how is your eulogy coming along? It's not too late to use the one we prepared. No one would blame you or be surprised you failed.

JANET

It's great. You should be prepared to hear a perfect eulogy. You might even cry.

AUNTIE AMY

We have crying on the schedule. And we'd really like to preview this eulogy of yours. Now.

Winnie barges in.

WINNIE

Janet, I just had the most brilliant idea for a memorial scholarship honoring Grandma. You just need to set it up and fund it. Shall I get the company checkbook?

Robert enters.

Janet, I ordered the leather booths from a guy who gave me a great deal, but they arrived and they're not leather. Or booths. Help Dad!

Through the doorway, we see Franklin about to enter but hastily retreat when he spots his mom in the office. Everyone tries to get Janet's attention, crescendoing.

> JANET STOP! Do you think I can run a whole company <u>and</u> do every little thing for you?

Everyone confirms this is true.

JANET (CONT'D) Incorrect! I'm not customer service for Chinese adults who can't seem to do anything themselves! Learn to handle your own problems because I'm not doing it anymore!

Janet stomps over to a bookcase, pulls on a specific book, and the whole thing swings open. It's a secret passage!! Janet steps through as everyone looks on in surprise.

> GENE Is that a secret passage to the storage room?

JANET Yes, I've always wanted one and I had it put in yesterday.

KATHY Aiya, such a waste of money--

JANET It's an extravagance, Mom!

The bookcase swings shut behind her.

INT. SECRET STORAGE ROOM - MOMENTS LATER

The modest storage room has no furniture except an inflatable kiddie pool filled with the company's fake money. Janet lays in the pool like Scrooge McDuck. We will of course pay to use Simon & Garfunkel "The Sound of Silence" in this scene.

END OF ACT TWO

ACT THREE

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - MASTER BEDROOM - NIGHT

JANET (V.O.) I felt bad. Just not enough to talk to anyone in my family.

Janet walks around looking through Grandma's stuff.

JANET (V.O.) Instead, I looked through Grandma's things but I still had nothing for the eulogy. That's the thing with immigrant parents and grandparents-they never tell you who they were in their previous lives.

Janet explores Grandma's amazing closet and discovers that she fits the clothes. She takes a particularly nice jacket.

> JANET (V.O.) At least I'll have something nice to wear while *not* giving a eulogy.

EXT. GERALD'S CAFE - NEXT DAY

JANET (V.O.) My dad was fed up with people constantly mistaking him for Gerald, the original owner of his deli, and decided to set the record straight once and for all.

The cafe is closed. A sign on the door says "GERALD DEAD."

JANET (V.O.) But he chose to do this on the same day it was closed for the funeral.

Beneath that sign is another sign: "CLOSED FOR FUNERAL."

JANET (V.O.) Leading his customers to believe the quiet man who regularly served them had just died.

Customers reading the sign look aghast.

EXT. CEMETERY - DAY

Many luxury cars line the parking lot. Attendees come in a wide-ranging spectrum of dress: all black, regular clothes, golf pastels, glitter and sequins. A mixed bag of propriety.

INT. FUNERAL CHAPEL - CONTINUOUS

Normal funeral set-up: Grandma's casket is on the dais. Instead of a photo, there is a huge oil painting of Grandma and an abundance of flowers. Guests are seated in the pews. Family members are up front. Winnie is dressed like she's going to a gala. Franklin is on the dais reading his speech.

> FRANKLIN Today, I honor my grandmother, by standing here an accomplished lawyer...

Embarrassed, he looks over to Auntie Linda who gestures to keep reading.

FRANKLIN (CONT'D) ...with a 1460 SAT score.

IN THE PEWS

The tension between Janet and the rest of the family is palpable. As the Aunties go up to take their turn on the dais, Janet leaves the pews (taking her jacket with her).

ON THE DAIS

Auntie Linda and Auntie Amy approach the casket. They exchange nods and whisper low to each other.

AUNTIE AMY I'll take the closed half.

AUNTIE LINDA I'll fall to the floor and clutch the side.

AUNTIE AMY Careful not to pull down too hard.

AUNTIE LINDA It's simple physics, Amy.

On cue, the two throw themselves on the casket, putting on a big show of wailing and crying.

INT. CHAPEL BATHROOM - CONTINUOUS

Janet enters to find Kathy unzipping a garment bag.

JANET Mom, what are you doing? You were told not to sing!

KATHY

You're not the boss of this funeral! You don't want to deal with us anymore, remember?

JANET

I just don't want to be in charge of *everyone's* problems.

KATHY

Do you understand that you getting Grandma's estate is a big deal? I finally have something to brag about and hold over your aunties' heads and you don't want it?

JANET

I can't believe this is the first time you're proud of me, and it's for something I didn't even earn.

KATHY

Of course you earned it!

JANET

Do you know how an inheritance works?

KATHY

Janet, the most successful and respected person in our family decided you were the best choice, over everyone else, to take over her legacy. That's 100 percent something to brag about.

JANET

I wish I knew why she chose me.

KATHY

It's obvious. She thought you were the most like her. The Zhao women are very self-absorbed and she wanted someone who would take care of everything the way she did. Janet smiles. This is a rare moment for her and Kathy.

KATHY (CONT'D) But if she could see how you're acting now, she would-- drink poison and jump off a cliff!

JANET Okay, that's excessive. And redundant. (walking away) I think it's time for the burial.

As Janet gets to the door --

KATHY And be nice to your dad. This has been the hardest on him.

JANET

Oh really. All he's been doing is obsessing over getting leather booths for his deli! Which I'm definitely not paying for.

KATHY

Improving the restaurant was the last thing Grandma asked him to do before she died.

JANET

Oh.

JANET (V.O.) I thought we were the kind of family that didn't deal with our emotions. I didn't realize my dad was working through his grief.

INT. ENTRYWAY - MOMENTS LATER

Janet finds her dad in the crowds heading outside.

JANET

Hey dad. I wanted to say... I should've realized why these leather booths are so important to you. And I understand now.

ROBERT I just want the best for my restaurant. (MORE)

ROBERT (CONT'D)

It deserves it after all the years it's given me. There will never be another one like it.

JANET

(getting the metaphor) I don't think "the restaurant" cares about all that. I think "the restaurant" ultimately wants you to be happy and healthy.

ROBERT

You're talking about my restaurant, right? Gerald's Cafe?

JANET

Yep. Good old Gerald's Cafe. I thought we barely knew anything about each other but she somehow knew what I wanted and needed.

ROBERT

Okay, it really doesn't seem like you're talking about my restaurant.

JANET (V.O.) That was the most emotional conversation we'd ever had.

ROBERT

I know you made it pretty clear that you don't like being a part of this family, but it'd be nice for us all to stick together. Because this is a tough time. No one really knows what to do now that your grandma isn't around to help us.

JANET

I...

Janet is speechless. Then Robert's cell phones rings, on full volume. He answers as he walks away.

ROBERT

Hello? Yeah, I can talk. Hold on, I'm putting you on speaker...

JANET (V.O.) I was so hung up on my family not being nice to me that I didn't realize I wasn't very nice myself. Janet puts on her (Grandma's) jacket to go outside. Just then, two FUNERAL EMPLOYEES carry a big portrait of Grandma wearing the exact same jacket behind her. Their poses match. Janet sees it.

> JANET (V.O.) And I wasn't just inheriting Grandma's estate, I was inheriting her role in the family.

Janet puts her hands in the jacket pockets and finds a small notebook with notes on every member of the family. Likes, dislikes, etc. Grandma had kept track of everyone's lives.

EXT. GRAVE - DAY

Everyone gathers around the gravesite. Winnie looks around the crowd and leans over to Franklin.

WINNIE If you had to pick, who here would you say looks like a rich guy in a rocky marriage?

FRANKLIN Who here would you say looks like a rich guy who isn't picky about hiring a lawyer? <u>Or</u> has snacks to share?

Everyone watches in silence-- broken by occasional cell phone rings-- as the casket is lowered into the ground.

JANET I'd like to say a few words. (steps forward) Grandma was a very successful person. Not just in the business she built, but also in the way she took care of our entire family. Sometimes family can feel like work-- endless, thankless work for a bunch of maniacs who never give you any credit or show any appreciation for all that work you do.

As she talks, we PAN ACROSS the family's reactions. Most are not self-aware enough to get that she's talking about them.

> JANET (CONT'D) But you still do it. Because things need to get done and what you're best at is <u>getting things</u> <u>done</u>. (MORE)

JANET (CONT'D) And also, maybe you love and care about these maniacs. That's what I've learned from Grandma. In death, she gave me a new life. And I'm going to create my own legacy, one as good as hers that I can pass on to an unsuspecting relative one day. (to grave) Rest in peace, Grandma.

Just then, Kathy, wearing a glittery gown, comes out singing into a cordless mic. Some inappropriate pop song in a high operatic soprano.

JANET (CONT'D) Oh crap, I forgot about that. (shouting above the singing) Winnie, Franklin, you guys can move in with me until you get back on your feet. Dad, leather booths are a terrible idea but we can talk about other ways to fix up your restaurant. Auntie Linda, Auntie Amy, I know, I know-- I'll go stop my mom!

But the singing is interrupted by the arrival of many of Robert's CUSTOMERS.

JANET (V.O.) But I didn't have to. My dad's regular customers, reeling from the news of his death--

EXT. 168 IMPORTS - DAY

CHYRON: EARLIER

The customers go next door to Grandma's company.

JANET (V.O.) --had wandered next door to Grandma's office--

INT. 168 IMPORTS - CONTINUOUS

Gene writes down info for the customers.

JANET (V.O.) Where her office assistant gave them all the information for the funeral.

EXT. GRAVE - BACK TO SCENE

JANET (V.O.) But at the sight of my dad--

The customers are shocked to see Robert in attendance.

CUSTOMER Oh my God, it's Gerald!

JANET (V.O.) The customers thought they were seeing a ghost. My dad did his best to explain the misunderstanding.

ROBERT

I'm Robert.

The Customers look at each other, confused for a moment, but then they get it.

JANET (V.O.) They assumed he must be the twin brother of the deceased Gerald.

CUSTOMER We're very sorry for your loss. Gerald meant so much to all of us. We'd love to honor him somehow.

Janet had been walking past but upon hearing this last line, she stops in her tracks and backs up.

INT. GERALD'S CAFE - DAY

JANET (V.O.) So we got my dad *a* leather booth.

Robert happily compares the photo in his catalog to an actual single, red leather booth wedged awkwardly at the front of the deli. A little plaque says "In Memory of Gerald." Below it, a second plaque says "And Mama."

END OF ACT THREE

EXT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - DAY

Janet, Winnie, and Franklin carry moving boxes inside.

JANET (V.O.) After the funeral, my cousins and I moved into Grandma's mansion.

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - MASTER BEDROOM - CONTINUOUS

An enormous portrait of Grandma Zhao dominates an entire wall, facing the bed. Janet stands looking at it.

JANET That'll take getting used to.

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - LIVING ROOM - MOMENTS LATER

Janet, carrying a plate of strawberries, walks past WORKERS hanging an oil painting of her.

JANET (V.O.) I didn't really want to live with family but I can make it work. It might even be fun.

A DELIVERY MAN has just set up a CHOCOLATE FOUNTAIN. Janet signs for it and he leaves. As the chocolate starts to flow, Janet and Franklin dip in the strawberries.

Winnie serves them a tray of tea. Franklin is about to take a cup but Janet stops him. It's diarrhea tea.

JANET

Don't drink that.

Janet confiscates the cups of tea and takes it into--

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - KITCHEN - CONTINUOUS

Janet walks in to find her parents unpacking moving boxes.

JANET What is this? What's happening? Why are you unpacking all your stuff? JANET (V.O.) Dumb question. I knew the answer. The horrible, horrible answer.

KATHY You own a mansion and you didn't think to share it with your own parents?

ROBERT This is every child's dream, to live with their parents again!

JANET For how long?

KATHY What a strange question!

JANET No, not strange. Very normal.

KATHY Don't worry about it.

JANET I truly will not be able to worry about anything else except this.

INT. GRANDMA'S HOUSE - MOMENTS LATER

Janet is on the phone with the Family Lawyer.

JANET What am I supposed to do? Kick out my own parents?

FAMILY LAWYER (heavy sigh) Okay. You have to stop talking to me about your personal issues with your family. I'm charging you four hundred dollars an hour every time we talk. It would be so much cheaper if you went to a therapist.

JANET (insulted, then considering) A therapist!... How much cheaper?

CUT TO BLACK.
