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1 INT. RECEPTION. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4, 1 3:10PM

BRIONY, 30, professional, demurely dressed, is in a secure area.

BRIONY

Hi.

RECEPTION Back again? Sign in please.

A photo is taken on a mini camera.

BRIONY deposits her phone, her keys, her gum and a rape alarm into a metal drawer.

She opens her handbag - we see a cling film wrapped sandwich, a tupperware of mini marshmallows, a notebook, and a paper file inside - and pats down her pockets to make sure that's everything.

The drawer is closed and someone retrieves all the objects on the other side. They are put into a bag.

BRIONY

OK?

2

RECEPTION

Yes love.

He slides underneath an ID badge. She walks through a metal detector and passes green.

She stands by a big door. There's a huge buzz and then it's opened.

INT. CORRIDOR. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4, 2 3:11PM

She walks down a corridor and up to a lift.

She looks up again at the camera, holding up her pass. The lift doors open.

She walks into the lift. She presses 2.

A man - coming from another door - hurries to get in the lift beside her. He presses 3.

CHARLIE You don't work here?

BRIONY I'm a visitor.

She shows her pass ID, it says BRIONY ARISTON, CLINICAL PSYCHOLOGIST.

CHARLIE

Right

The doors open. She walks out without looking back.

3 INT. LOBBY. 2ND FLOOR. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4, 3:12PM

VICTOR is waiting for her.

VICTOR Right - do you want to just come through for a sec?

She's ushered in and through to Victor's office.

BRIONY Sorry I'm a bit late

4 INT. OFFICE. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4, 3:13PM

There is a bank of CCTV screens which VICTOR has been monitoring.

VICTOR That's alright. I saw you coming up on the cameras. He's being brought down.

BRIONY I heard he was involved in a violent incident.

VICTOR How d'you hear that?

BRIONY It was reported up. It'd be useful to see it -

VICTOR Is it relevant to what you'll - uh assess?

BRIONY I'd like to see it.

VICTOR OK. I'll heat up the megaport.

VICTOR goes to a computer and begins flicking through various files.

BRIONY looks up at the CCTV screen and flicks between them. On one a session is happening with eight kids sat in a circle, on another two kids sit drawing together, on another a group of kids are watching TV, and on one she sees JAMIE's face vividly framed.

He's being brought through a security door by a big bloke called FRANK.

VICTOR (CONT'D) He's been pretty quiet.

BRIONY

Yeah.

VICTOR If that's relevant - if what I think - observe - is relevant to what you assess.

BRIONY says nothing.

VICTOR finds the file.

VICTOR (CONT'D) And here we go -

We watch JAMIE fighting with another kid. It gets quite violent between them. But it's quite equal, both are getting blows in.

VICTOR (CONT'D) It was just bruising and scratching.

BRIONY I read the report.

VICTOR Both blamed the other.

BRIONY I know. I read the report.

(MORE)

BRIONY (CONT'D)

VICTOR You're on what? 5 visits?

BRIONY

Yes.

VICTOR Do you know what you're going to say in the report?

BRIONY I wouldn't be here if I knew that.

 $$\rm VICTOR$$ The other one – the other one of you – only needed 3 –

BRIONY Please don't say any more. It's important I know nothing of what the other psychologist - says, does or thinks.

VICTOR smiles. BRIONY looks back at the CCTV screens. JAMIE is no longer on them. She scans across them.

BRIONY (CONT'D) It's about making the right assessment, not the fastest assessment.

VICTOR Sorry, I'm just being an idiot.

BRIONY No. Just the way I work.

A green button suddenly flashes.

VICTOR Right - that's Jamie in place.

BRIONY nods.

VICTOR (CONT'D) I'll take you through.

5.

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BRIONY I need to get a hot chocolate from the machine.

VICTOR

I remember.

He nods and presses a button to release the door.

5 INT. CORRIDOR. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4, 5 3:17PM

They walk to a drinks machine. BRIONY pushes a button. Hot chocolate starts to pour.

There's the sudden sound of a scream, she turns towards it.

VICTOR Got a torture lab in the basement. Government approved. All very hush hush.

BRIONY takes the tupperware from her handbag. She empties the mini marshmallows into the hot chocolate. This is very deliberate. VICTOR frowns as he watches her.

VICTOR (CONT'D) What are they?

BRIONY He likes his hot chocolate with marshmallows on.

VICTOR You must mean business. You never did them before.

BRIONY says nothing. A siren blares. VICTOR listens to it.

VICTOR (CONT'D) Mark I think. I can tell who they are by their screams now. 12. Abused by his mother quite brutally. Radiator burns all over him. Poor kid. Don't know what he did to get here. He's not famous like your Jamie.

Two CARE WORKERS come rushing past.

VICTOR (CONT'D) Come on! Move it!

She nods, she's used to VICTOR, she walks towards the door. VICTOR inputs a code and the door swings open with a buzz.

6.

6 INT. VISITOR ROOM. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4, 3:18PM

This is quite a large room, made for quite a few people. The room is multipurpose. There's boardgames and balls - all locked away - but it doesn't smell of prison.

There is one table in the middle, which has JAMIE sat at it. FRANK is stood behind him.

BRIONY smiles as she approaches JAMIE. He half smiles back. She's immediately warmer with him than we've seen her with anyone previously.

FRANK You OK?

BRIONY Yes. Hi Jamie.

JAMIE

Hi.

FRANK You need us, we're here.

BRIONY

Yes.

FRANK Same goes for you Jamie.

JAMIE

I know.

FRANK We'll be watching OK Jamie?

JAMIE nods.

FRANK exits the room with VICTOR just behind him.

BRIONY puts down the hot chocolate. She smiles again.

BRIONY Hot chocolate. Lots of sprinkles.

JAMIE

You remembered? Thanks.

She pushes the hot chocolate across the table to him. He touches the sprinkles.

BRIONY And I saved you half my sandwich in case you were hungry.

She takes the cling film wrapped sandwich out of her bag.

JAMIE

What is it?

BRIONY Cheese and pickle.

JAMIE

No tomatoes?

BRIONY Tomatoes don't go very well with pickle.

JAMIE (HOPEFUL)

No salad?

She unwraps the cling film - laughing.

BRIONY Would I do that to you? No tomatoes, no salad. Just cheese and pickle. Do you want it? I'll save it for later.

JAMIE I'll have it. Not sure about the pickle but I'll have it.

She passes it across to him. She's wary but she likes him.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Did you make it?

BRIONY

Yeah.

JAMIE You make butties do you?

BRIONY You think that's weird?

JAMIE Yeah. No. My Mum makes butties.

BRIONY (SMILE) That makes two of us then.

Beat. He drinks the hot chocolate.

JAMIE This is good.

BRIONY Careful. It's a bit hot -

JAMIE I don't mind hot.

Beat.

BRIONY You're looking better than last time.

JAMIE What does that mean?

BRIONY You've got some of your colour back.

JAMIE (GRIN) You sound like a granny.

BRIONY

Do I?

JAMIE

"Oh, you got your colour back Jamie. You can't have been that ill."

BRIONY (LAUGHING) That's a good voice.

JAMIE

No.

Beat.

BRIONY Do you see your grandparents much?

JAMIE (SARDONIC) Not recently.

BRIONY No, I meant before - all this.

JAMIE

No. A bit. My Dad's - side. My Mum - don't get on with hers.

BRIONY

Yes, of course, we talked about that. What's your Dad's Mum and Dad like?

JAMIE I don't know. Like him.

BRIONY What does that mean?

JAMIE They like things as they like them. "No gravy? (MORE) ADOLESCENCE Episode 3 - Shooting Draft with YELLOW amends - Stephen Graham & Jack Thorne JAMIE (CONT'D) Such a shame" or "I like a slice with my dinner if you've got one in, Amanda". BRIONY Slice of what? JAMIE Bread. You're posh aren't you? BRIONY No. I'm just - not from where you're from. JAMIE What do you call bread? If you don't call it a slice -BRIONY (SMILING) Um. Bread. JAMIE You're posh. BRIONY laughs again. BRIONY If it makes you - happy that I am then I am. JAMIE What do you call your Grandad? Bet you call him Grandpa? BRIONY I do not. JAMIE Bet you do. BRIONY I call him - Poppop. JAMIE Poppop?? They both laugh. She knows how it sounds. BRIONY I do. Yes. JAMIE 'Poppop' - really? BRIONY Yes.

JAMIE Jesus - I've not heard that one before.

BRIONY

Ok

She laughs.

JAMIE You're *really* posh.

BRIONY I don't know why I call him that. Maybe he asked me to. You not gonna eat your sandwich?

JAMIE I'll eat it later. It's just the pickle. I hate it.

She smiles and she looks at him carefully.

BRIONY You hate it? I really messed up then. So can we talk about you you see a lot of your Dad in your Grandad, do you?

JAMIE Yeah. I don't know.

BRIONY Is it just what they say - or how they do things? What's your Dad and his Dad like?

JAMIE knows she's getting serious now. He smiles, trying to deflect her.

JAMIE

Um. Men?

BRIONY Does that mean - are they quite is masculine an OK word to use?

JAMIE

You used it.

BRIONY Now when I hear the word masculine, I think: They can mend things. They like making things. They like sport. They like going to the pub.

JAMIE Yeah. Not the pub. But yeah.

BRIONY Your Dad doesn't go to the pub?

JAMIE

Not really. A bit. Not as much as my Poppop does.

BRIONY (LAUGHING) You're not going to let me forget that are you? So your Grandad's more of a pub man is he?

JAMIE (WHAT?) I don't know. He's not round that much. Grandad.

BRIONY

How much?

JAMIE

Uh. You really want to... Every other Sunday maybe. Sometimes in the week. To look after us if they're both - Mum and Dad are both working. But that's more Granny. Bit more in the holidays. We went to Tenerife with them once.

BRIONY

On holiday?

JAMIE (DRY) No. Banana picking.

BRIONY smiles. We see she's working toward something.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Obviously it was on holiday.

BRIONY laughs.

BRIONY

OK. If I was also - thinking about masculine - men - the other thing I'd think about in relation to masculine men is how they -

JAMIE This all started cos I said you sounded like a granny.

BRIONY

What?

He's noticed she's driving toward something. JAMIE notices things.

JAMIE This all started *because* I said you sounded like a granny. Now you're going on about 'masculine' stuff.

BRIONY

Yes.

JAMIE First time you came you had actual questions - is this right Jamie? (MORE) ADOLESCENCE Episode 3 - Shooting Draft with YELLOW amends - Stephen Graham & Jack Thorne JAMIE (CONT'D) Do you know whether this is wrong Jamie? Now you just chat shit. BRIONY I hope I don't. JAMIE First time you're all "If an adult guinea pig eats one of its kids, is that normal or weird?" Now you're -"what do you call bread?" BRIONY JAMIE (CONT'D) Come on. I'm just -Cos this all - feels like a interested in your Dad and trick so... your Grandad. BRIONY (CONT'D) A trick? A trick into what? JAMIE My Dad's OK, alright? BRIONY Yes. Yes. I know. JAMIE Just - talking about him - there isn't a need -BRIONY OK. If that's how you feel. But I'm not tricking you. There's a silence. JAMIE And now I've pissed you off. BRIONY No. JAMIE Can I see - what you got written down about me? BRIONY (SMILING) Do you see me writing anything down? JAMIE You must write stuff down. BRIONY Yes.

JAMIE

Can I see what you wrote - you've written?

BRIONY Of course you can't.

JAMIE Dillon - and the other lawyers they say you work for us.

BRIONY That isn't what they say and I know

that because I asked them the last time you said that to me.

JAMIE You talk to them?

BRIONY I've explained this Jamie, I've been employed by your team, but I don't work for you.

JAMIE What do you tell them?

BRIONY I am writing an independent that's a really important word here

JAMIE What do they say to you?

BRIONY - an independent pre-sentence offence report - which the Judge will read in order to get an understanding of you and your understanding of the charges, OK?

There's a silence.

BRIONY (CONT'D)

All I want to do - is talk to you Jamie, and have you talk to me. Like you say, I've asked some straightforward questions. But I think - you - and everyone else in fact - are more complicated than straightforward - questions allow for. We had a good conversation last time. Can't we try that again?

JAMIE sits back, unsure for a moment. And then grudgingly leans in again.

JAMIE What did we talk about last time?

BRIONY

Your sister. Your Mum. Your friends. We went all over the place. Just like this time.

JAMIE

Can't remember saying much about them.

BRIONY

You did. And how you felt about them. How well Lisa does, what you think your Mum thinks of you. That sort of thing.

JAMIE And now you want to talk about Dad?

BRIONY I want to talk about lots of things. I can tell you what I wrote down - the questions I wrote down to talk to you about today - if that helps?

JAMIE

Yes.

BRIONY

I wrote about - well, I wanted to talk about the fight you had -

JAMIE

That was nothing.

BRIONY

I was interested why you got in a fight -

JAMIE He actually hit me first.

BRIONY

Why?

JAMIE We've had a beef. Over - stuff. It doesn't really matter. It wasn't a proper fight.

BRIONY You're telling me it's not that interesting?

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY OK. Let's move on.

JAMIE (GRIN) I'm in charge now am I?

BRIONY And I wrote that I wanted to talk to you about what being a man feels like -

JAMIE (LAUGHING) You want a cock and balls?

BRIONY

No. I'm interested - in what being a man feels like - for you -

JAMIE is immediately a bit concerned.

JAMIE

I don't know.

BRIONY

Too big a question right? And the fight is too small a question. And that's why - you see - it's more useful - for me - to see where the conversation goes and steer it a bit - into - for instance - what you think of your Dad and Grandad and what kind of men you think they are - rather than saying - "So Jamie, what do you think being a man feels like?"

JAMIE half laughs.

JAMIE (POSH VOICE) "So Jamie, what do you think being a man feels like?"

BRIONY It's not a trick. Just a conversation. Like I say. So do you think it's OK - to talk about your Dad... a bit...

JAMIE considers the question.

JAMIE Can't I see your notes - what you wrote? How you wrote it?

BRIONY (SMILE) No. You're not that in charge. Does your Dad like his job?

JAMIE He fixes toilets, what d'you think? He works hard. Long hours. You get the best money for emergency plumbing out of hours, you know?

BRIONY

Is he funny?

JAMIE

Sometimes.

BRIONY

Loving?

JAMIE No. That'd be weird.

BRIONY

Angry?

JAMIE takes a beat.

JAMIE

I - suppose.

BRIONY How angry does he get?

JAMIE He's never hit me.

BRIONY

OK. Go on.

JAMIE Go on what? Is that what this is about?

BRIONY Why do you call him angry?

JAMIE He just gets mad - we all do -

BRIONY So he's just angry - he's just angry in a normal way -

JAMIE thinks. BRIONY watches him carefully.

JAMIE

He pulled the shed down once. When he was really - in a proper rager but that's - as bad as it's got.

BRIONY Were you frightened?

JAMIE

Not really. I thought it was funny. Lisa did too. Then Mum sent us upstairs. He's not like that most of the time though. Hardly ever.

BRIONY

What does your Dad do when he's not working?

JAMIE

It feels like you're testing him.

BRIONY

No. I'm just trying to understand your view of him. He's - correct me if I'm wrong - a very big presence in your life and your - he was your appropriate adult.

JAMIE

Cos he doesn't judge. Cos - because he's kind. He's kind.

BRIONY

Well, that is good to know. What does he do when he's got time off?

JAMIE

Um. He likes basically all sport. My Mum always says he'd watch lawn bowls and make it fun.

BRIONY Do you watch lawn bowls with him?

JAMIE

No. Not for me.

BRIONY You're not into sport?

JAMIE

No.

BRIONY

All of it?

JAMIE Yeah. I'm not good at much but I'm really good at getting out of PE.

BRIONY How did you do that?

JAMIE Headache. Hurt my leg. Funny tummy. "I feel a bit dizzy Sir, can I sit down for a bit". That sort of thing.

BRIONY And what did - does your Dad make of that?

JAMIE He didn't - doesn't know.

There's a pause. BRIONY is waiting for something.

JAMIE (CONT'D) He knew I wasn't - sporty or anything. I used to - he used to take me to football - this football thing - Saturday mornings - and he'd stand and cheer me on - and I'd fuck up and he'd -

BRIONY

He'd what?

Beat.

BRIONY (CONT'D)

Jamie?

Beat.

JAMIE He'd just look away.

BRIONY Pretend he didn't see?

JAMIE Maybe. Or maybe - he didn't want me to see him - looking - sorry.

BRIONY

Sorry?

JAMIE I don't know. Ashamed.

JAMIE looks at her, an exposed wound for a moment.

BRIONY And how did you feel when you saw that? Shame?

JAMIE You're supposed to say he wasn't.

BRIONY

Am I?

JAMIE You're supposed to say - "bet he wasn't ashamed - bet you just thought that Jamie -"

BRIONY Is that what other people have said to you?

JAMIE "Oh, no, it wasn't what you really think - no, he wouldn't be ashamed not of his kid" - that sort of thing.

BRIONY You hear that a lot?

JAMIE It's just the right thing to say.

BRIONY Isn't it lying?

JAMIE No. I don't know. I don't like lying.

Beat.

BRIONY I didn't like school sport either.

JAMIE But you were good at other stuff though, right?

BRIONY Why do you think that?

JAMIE You look like you were. An' you're clever so -

BRIONY Were you not... Did you not think you were - good at anything else?

JAMIE thinks how to answer that question.

JAMIE I didn't care I wasn't.

BRIONY meets his eyes.

BRIONY Must be hard though to feel that way. JAMIE No. I think most people think like that. BRIONY Most people think they're bad at everything? JAMIE Most people are. Beat. BRIONY Does your sister feel like that? JAMIE Lisa's clever. BRIONY Your Dad? JAMIE I don't know. Mum does though. BRIONY Your Mum thinks she's bad at everything? JAMIE She can cook a roast. But - yeah. I mean you'd have to ask her. But yeah. Beat. JAMIE (CONT'D) I don't know. Have you - met them? BRIONY Your family? JAMIE Yeah. BRIONY I talked to your Dad on the phone. This half surprises JAMIE.

JAMIE

Yeah?

BRIONY Yes. As part of my assessment. I've also visited your school and read your reports.

JAMIE can't quite work out how to respond to that.

JAMIE (SOFT)

How is he?

BRIONY He's OK. Sad you're here. I can't say more than that.

Beat. JAMIE thinks. He tries to pull himself out of the mud.

JAMIE

Yeah.

Beat.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Well, it's wrong. I'm here.

Beat.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Can I ask you a question?

BRIONY Of course you can.

JAMIE Can you get me out of this place?

BRIONY I'm afraid I'm of no use to you there.

JAMIE Why couldn't they put me in a proper prison?

BRIONY A better facility wasn't available for you.

JAMIE But putting me in a mad house -

BRIONY It is a secure training centre -

JAMIE Yeah? What they training us for? The other boys - they scream all the time.

BRIONY I thought it had been explained -

This is tipping out of him now, his words speed up.

JAMIE

And they rock backwards and forwards, and they shout at Coronation Street -

BRIONY Young offender's institutions are for fifteen up.

JAMIE All the way through Corrie -

BRIONY

You couldn't be placed in a secure school. It wasn't safe.

JAMIE

One kid goes nuts every time he sees Steve McDonald.

BRIONY There wasn't anywhere better for you to be -

JAMIE stands up.

JAMIE Ryan gets to stay at home til his trial -

BRIONY Ryan wasn't accused of such a serious crime. Sit down.

JAMIE Accused, it's all accused. If I did it, if I - hurt - her - then I'd get it - but I didn't, so...

BRIONY As I understand it, and this wasn't my decision, this was the best place for you.

JAMIE Will I be moved for the trial?

BRIONY Nothing has been decided yet.

JAMIE D'you know where it's gonna be? London or somewhere more local?

BRIONY Honestly Jamie, talk to Dillon, talk to anyone else, this is nothing to do with me. Back in your chair now.

JAMIE

Does that mean you don't know or you won't tell me?

BRIONY

I'm not involved in any logistics and - in terms of the progress of the case - nothing has been decided yet. You need to sit down Jamie.

JAMIE I don't want to sit down.

BRIONY If you don't sit down, I have to stop this discussion -

JAMIE Maybe I want you to...

BRIONY

Do you?

JAMIE

Piss you off that wouldn't it? You'd have to go home and then back again.

BRIONY If you don't sit down -

He smashes what's left of his hot chocolate.

JAMIE

I DON'T WANT TO FUCKING SIT DOWN. Stop telling me to sit down all the time. You do not get to tell me what to do. Look at me now. You do not control what I do with my life. Get that in your head.

FRANK enters the door at the side of the room.

FRANK Everything OK? Jamie?

JAMIE I shouted. I'm sorry.

BRIONY There isn't a problem.

FRANK You need him taking out for a bit?

BRIONY

No.

Beat. She's shaken, but not showing it.

BRIONY (CONT'D) But I'll get a cup of tea. If that's OK.

JAMIE Can I have another hot chocolate?

BRIONY

Sure.

JAMIE You don't have to.

BRIONY

Sure.

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She exits the room. FRANK watches her go.

<u>INT. CORRIDOR. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4,</u> <u>3:32PM</u>

BRIONY walks down the corridor to the drinks machine.

She stands, facing it, taking some deep breaths. She's deliberately trying to calm herself down.

She hears footsteps behind her. She stiffens. She knows who it is.

VICTOR (O.S.) Causing trouble is he?

BRIONY says nothing for a beat.

BRIONY Can I look - into the room -

VICTOR There's no audio.

BRIONY Can I look -

VICTOR Of course. Me casa is your casa. Or whatever they say.

8 INT. OFFICE. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4, 3:33PM

VICTOR opens the door, and presses a button on the console to bring up the visitor room.

JAMIE is sitting. FRANK standing beside him. Neither is saying anything.

BRIONY opens her bag. She pulls out a notebook. She starts to read it. VICTOR tries to read it too. But she - very subtly - makes sure he can't.

VICTOR What you seeing?

Beat. BRIONY stays intent on watching. She writes a few things down in her book. She's composing what she's going to say next.

VICTOR (CONT'D) What you looking for? Is it body language stuff. I'm reading a book on that at the moment.

Beat.

VICTOR (CONT'D) My sister gave it me.

Beat.

VICTOR (CONT'D) People hide - don't need to tell you this - hide so much - but maybe they tell their truth with their bodies and their - faces.

BRIONY

Maybe.

Beat.

VICTOR I couldn't do what you do.

BRIONY I'm sure I couldn't do what you do.

VICTOR

You want to job swap? What are your hours? What's your pay? What's your holiday allowance?

He smiles. She writes two more things down. Then shuts the book.

BRIONY No. I like my job. Most of the time.

VICTOR Well, I hate mine so you're probably best off.

BRIONY Right. That's all I needed.

VICTOR Dib dib dib. Pleased to help.

She walks out of the room. VICTOR follows.

9 <u>INT. CORRIDOR. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4,</u> 9 <u>3:34PM</u> 9

She walks quickly down the corridor. VICTOR stands watching her, all of her, he is a creepy fucker. The camera follows her, but with eyes towards him.

As we check in with her face, BRIONY knows she's being watched.

A kid with severe tics is brought past accompanied by a large man, KEITH. She stands aside to let him go.

The kid looks accusingly towards her. She lowers her eyes, avoiding confrontation.

KEITH

Come on Mark.

The kid follows on meekly. BRIONY watches him go. Then she turns to look at VICTOR.

Who smiles like there's nothing wrong at all.

She knocks on the door. She looks back at VICTOR, who is still smiling.

FRANK opens the door.

FRANK Would you be more comfortable - me staying inside?

BRIONY No. I wouldn't like that at all.

She walks into the room.

10 INT. VISITOR ROOM. STANDLING SECURE TRAINING CENTRE - DAY 4, 3:35PM

She walks over to the table, JAMIE turns and watches her. He registers the absence of hot drinks.

She sits down. She takes a beat. She checks FRANK has shut the door.

BRIONY

Right.

She composes herself.

BRIONY (CONT'D) I'm not a police officer Jamie. I'm not here to elicit a confession, I'm here to understand. You think I'm trying to trick you -

JAMIE I said that ages ago.

BRIONY I'm not here to determine guilt or innocence, just get an understanding of your understanding -

JAMIE half smiles.

JAMIE

And I understand that you need to understand my understanding. Go on. Ask questions. I'll be better now.

There's a silence while she composes the right question in her head.

BRIONY

I suppose the other thing I think of when I think about masculinity is about how - masculine men feel about women.

JAMIE We back on that?

BRIONY Yes. Is that OK?

JAMIE Yes. I understand you need to understand my understanding of women.

BRIONY realises.

BRIONY

I forgot your hot chocolate.

JAMIE

Doesn't matter.

BRIONY

I'll go get it -

She stands again.

JAMIE

It's fine, sit down, please. You didn't get your tea neither. It doesn't matter. I don't - didn't deserve it. I shouted. Ask your questions about women. Men. Whatever.

Beat.

BRIONY

You must have - views - on men and women - how does your Dad treat your Mum?

JAMIE Are you trying to get at my Dad again?

BRIONY Not get at him.

JAMIE Dad's actually nice to Mum.

BRIONY You did say he tore down a shed.

JAMIE He gets angry with himself, sometimes, but he doesn't ever hit her.

BRIONY Does he talk to other women?

JAMIE

What?

BRIONY Is he friendly with other women?

JAMIE My Dad? No. He loves my Mum.

BRIONY I was asking whether any of his friends were women -

JAMIE No. His mates are his mates.

BRIONY And they're men.

JAMIE Is that wrong? What does that mean?

BRIONY No. That's not wrong.

JAMIE I thought we'd done with talking about my Dad -

BRIONY I'm just trying to -

JAMIE Understand. I know. But none of this has anything to do with him. I'm not - to do with him.

Beat. BRIONY reconsiders her questions.

BRIONY Fine. That's OK. Do you - Jamie have any mates who are women?

JAMIE

No.

BRIONY Like your Dad. Your mates are - male.

JAMIE The other shrink asks more - normal - questions - you know that?

BRIONY

OK.

JAMIE You want to know what he asks?

BRIONY I can't - know.

JAMIE I'm just saying...

BRIONY I can't know Jamie. My conclusions have to be independent.
JAMIE Yeah. I won't say anything. Yeah.

Beat. BRIONY leans forward, anxious to take control again.

BRIONY What do you think of women Jamie?

JAMIE I like them.

BRIONY But you're not - like you say particularly friends with them?

JAMIE I'm not a twat though.

BRIONY Are you attracted to women?

JAMIE Yeah. I said that. I'm not gay.

BRIONY We've established you don't have a girlfriend -

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY But I don't think I asked - before: Do you want a girlfriend?

That's a stupid question.

JAMIE Yeah. Who doesn't?

BRIONY finds her line.

BRIONY If you had a girlfriend, what would you like to do with her?

JAMIE What does that mean?

BRIONY Would you like to take her out? Where would you take her?

JAMIE I don't know. Cinema.

BRIONY The cinema. To see what kind of film?

JAMIE I don't know. A horror.

BRIONY A horror film? 15 certificate?

JAMIE Yeah. They're pretty slack. You can get in.

BRIONY And after the cinema. Would you - go for a walk with her? Or take her straight home?

JAMIE No. Not straight home.

BRIONY Would you want to kiss her?

JAMIE Are you allowed to ask these questions?

BRIONY You don't discuss this in PSHE?

Beat. He smiles.

BRIONY (CONT'D) What do you think is the normal for your age - the normal amount someone your age would do sexually - with a boy or a girl -

JAMIE I told you, I'm not gay.

BRIONY I wasn't suggesting that you were.

JAMIE You really want me to answer?

BRIONY

If you can.

JAMIE I don't know. Touching. Kissing.

BRIONY What do you mean by touching?

JAMIE

Really? Touching her - bits -

BRIONY

Her chest?

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY Her backside?

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY Her vulva - her vagina?

JAMIE looks at her, incredulous.

JAMIE I don't know. Maybe.

BRIONY Probably not?

JAMIE (WITH A SHY GRIN) Maybe. Are you sure you're allowed to ask these questions?

BRIONY

So you think - normal - for a 13 year old boy who is heterosexual normal for a 13 year old boy to have engaged in touching of a girl's chest and her backside. Above or below clothes.

JAMIE

Below. Maybe. Above - mostly.

BRIONY smiles, reassuring him. But JAMIE misinterprets the smile. He thinks she's laughing at him. He's on edge.

JAMIE (CONT'D) I've actually done that. So don't... Kissing and touching.

BRIONY

OK.

JAMIE And I've had two girls show me their tits. Sorry. Chest.

BRIONY OK. You don't have to use my language.

JAMIE And I touched them. So...

BRIONY

OK.

JAMIE And one of them sort of touched me too, my - uh - through my trousers.

BRIONY

OK.

JAMIE And - I think - she liked it.

BRIONY And you liked it?

JAMIE

Course.

Beat. He looks at her quickly. He wants to rewind.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Not really.

BRIONY You didn't like it?

JAMIE I don't know.

BRIONY

There's no wrong or right answer Jamie, in this room, you know that? Just your best attempt at the truth.

JAMIE looks down at the table.

His unhappiness seeping through. He's losing control in a different way here.

JAMIE No. I didn't. She didn't. That didn't happen.

BRIONY You weren't touched on your trousers?

JAMIE Yeah. No. I wasn't.

BRIONY And did two - girls - reveal their go topless - with you?

Beat. He hates rewinding.

JAMIE No. But I saw photos.

BRIONY You saw porn photos -

JAMIE

No. Not porn. Everyone sees porn. Of two girls in my year. I saw photos. Of two girls. I knew. Know.

BRIONY notices the knew/know but doesn't make much of it.

BRIONY You saw photos of two girls in your year topless?

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY Would they be happy you saw the photos?

JAMIE Everyone else did.

BRIONY sits back, thinking.

BRIONY Was Katie one of those two girls?

JAMIE looks up, shocked.

JAMIE How d'you know that?

BRIONY And how did it feel - to look at a picture of her?

JAMIE How d'you guess that?

BRIONY (BECAUSE OF KNEW/KNOW) I didn't guess it, I asked it. And now I want to know what it felt like - to see her - like that.

JAMIE You asking whether I got a - ?

BRIONY I'm asking how did it feel?

JAMIE I liked it. Are we allowed to talk like this?

BRIONY How does it make you feel looking at naked pictures of women?

JAMIE How d'you think?

BRIONY In particular, how would you describe the way you feel looking at naked pictures of people you know?

JAMIE I don't know. Good.

BRIONY Does it make you feel powerful? Do you feel like it gives you a power?

JAMIE No. That's weird.

Beat.

BRIONY Were you attracted to Katie?

JAMIE She wasn't my type.

BRIONY So you weren't?

JAMIE She was quite - no offence - quite flat, you know?

BRIONY

Right.

JAMIE

Everyone said it. Who saw it. That's not just me. Picture got passed around the school. Snapchat you know. And it was just her - top half. Not - not anything else. She sent it to Fidget - and he sent it on.

BRIONY Why did she send it to Fidget?

JAMIE I don't know. She fancied him?

BRIONY She was trying to attract him?

JAMIE And I think he asked her. Not going to get any more pictures though, is he?

BRIONY No. She's dead.

JAMIE looks at her, stung.

JAMIE

No. I didn't mean from her. I meant - from other girls. No-one'll send him other pictures because he wasn't careful with the one he got. The twat.

BRIONY You think he should have collected more pictures from more girls before he shared them with other boys?

JAMIE Yeah? I don't know.

Beat.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Why d'you say 'she's dead' like that?

BRIONY

Because she is.

Beat. We see BRIONY question herself for a moment as JAMIE looks at her carefully.

She wants to place every step she takes securely.

She knows exactly what understanding she needs to reach.

BRIONY (CONT'D) Do you think - Jamie - I've asked you if you're attracted to women do you think women are attracted to you?

JAMIE What sort of question is that?

BRIONY What do you think? Do you think girls - are attracted to you?

JAMIE No. Of course not.

BRIONY Why of course not?

How the fuck is he supposed to answer this? He tries truth.

JAMIE Because I'm - ugly.

BRIONY And how does that make you feel?

He hates this.

JAMIE Aren't you supposed to say I'm not ugly?

BRIONY

What I think isn't important -

JAMIE Yeah, you don't say stuff that normal people say -

BRIONY How would it make you feel if I did say 'you're not ugly'?

JAMIE I just - don't know why you don't say the things normal people say.

BRIONY

You thought I should have contradicted you when you said your Dad was ashamed of you - and you think I should contradict you now when you tell me you think yourself ugly.

JAMIE

I don't know.

Beat. She keeps her eyes down.

BRIONY

What I'm interested in is the fact you think you're ugly, Jamie.

JAMIE (WITH A HURT SMILE) Yeah. I'm fascinating.

BRIONY I'm interested in it because what you think is more important to me than what is true, OK? So - how do you feel about being ugly.

JAMIE starts to get worked up.

JAMIE How would you feel? You don't know.

You're not. You're dead pretty.

BRIONY

This is not about me Jamie.

JAMIE You don't think you're pretty?

BRIONY I am not the interesting person in this room.

JAMIE You <u>don't</u> think you're pretty - you <u>do</u> think I'm ugly.

BRIONY I haven't passed judgement on either of those things. If you think about it - for very good reason.

JAMIE "For very good reason".

BRIONY I want to understand you.

JAMIE is getting seriously worked up.

JAMIE To understand my understanding of my understanding of my understanding -

BRIONY

Yes.

JAMIE The other bloke is much more easy.

JAMIE (CONT'D) BRIONY Him, checking whether I They need two opinions for a understand was much easier - reason. This is how I like to establish my assessment.

> JAMIE (CONT'D) Whether I understand what I did -

He thumps the table, looking at the cameras in the room.

JAMIE (CONT'D) I didn't say that so don't go thinking that I did - I was just getting mixed up because she was making me -

He stands up.

BRIONY, her adrenaline rising, looks down at her extremely conservative clothes. She keeps herself under control. She doesn't look at JAMIE.

He walks around the room.

FRANK enters the room, BRIONY signals with her hand for him to leave, he does. JAMIE notices.

JAMIE (CONT'D) What was that? What was that? What the fuck? Signalling him away like a fucking - queen?

He gets right in her face, staring.

BRIONY You want to come and sit back down, Jamie?

JAMIE Fuck off. Fucking bitch.

BRIONY (FIRM) Jamie, I need you to sit down.

JAMIE looks at her for a long moment.

JAMIE

Rah!

BRIONY jumps, but tries to hide it.

She doesn't want him breaking the power dynamics of the room.

He takes a breath. He wants to scream. He doesn't scream.

He takes another breath. He controls himself.

He shoves at his chair.

He walks around the room, calming down.

BRIONY

Are you going to sit down?

JAMIE

Fuck off!

He continues pacing. She waits in silence. Eventually, he picks up his chair and comes to sit back down.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Go on then, go. Are you going?

BRIONY Would you like me to?

JAMIE It's not up to me, is it?

BRIONY If you want me to go, Jamie, I can go.

Beat.

BRIONY (CONT'D) You said in our previous sessions that you had friends - Ryan and Tommy, but that you weren't popular -

JAMIE

Yes.

BRIONY You said you would consider yourself bullied. The three of you were bullied.

JAMIE People like you love talking about bullying.

BRIONY You said Tommy was called Round Pounds because his Mum bought her shopping from Poundland.

JAMIE Yeah. She doesn't -

BRIONY And that Ryan was called dumb -

JAMIE Ryan \underline{is} dumb. That one was sort of true -

BRIONY You said that the three of you felt ostracised quite a lot.

JAMIE

Big words coming out now.

BRIONY

You said sometimes this got physical. That sometimes people would spit on your back from the windows of classrooms. How you'd be tripped up a lot. Pushed.

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY You were called names and you were physically abused...

JAMIE Just tripped and spat on.

BRIONY My question is then, Jamie, why do

you have an Instagram account?

JAMIE What? Need one.

BRIONY

Why?

JAMIE

To look at other people's Instagram accounts. You can't if you haven't got one.

BRIONY Right. You follow lots of women on Instagram. Models.

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY

You don't need to put photos up though. Why do you put photos up? Of yourself I mean...

This feels more difficult.

JAMIE

I don't know.

BRIONY

To show - the fun you have with Tommy and Ryan? To prove those bullies wrong?

JAMIE

No.

BRIONY To show the fun you have with your family?

JAMIE No way am I putting anything up of them. You seen anything like that it's cos my sister tagged me -

BRIONY Because you think someone might like one of your photos - you might get into a conversation? Make a new friend - meet a girl -

JAMIE (YES)

No.

BRIONY takes a breath. She knows she's getting to the nub of this.

BRIONY

Katie commented on your photos on a number of different occasions...

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY She wrote this -

She stands to get her bag from near the table.

JAMIE

What are you doing? Are you allowed to ask this stuff? Has Dillon passed these questions fit?

BRIONY

I am allowed to ask about intimacies. If it makes you uncomfortable, or makes you ask questions, there are other people in this facility who can help you with that.

JAMIE

I'm fine with girls.

Beat. BRIONY takes some printouts from her bag.

BRIONY Katie wrote this on your Facebook feed -

JAMIE (JESUS CHRIST)

Facebook??

BRIONY

Instagram -

JAMIE Are you OK? You look a bit red? Did I scare you when I shouted?

BRIONY She wrote this on your Instagram feed -

JAMIE Because I'm only 13 and don't think I look that - scary so -

BRIONY What do these emojis mean?

JAMIE How embarrassing is that? Wow.

BRIONY Can you tell me what these emojis mean? What does the kidney beans mean? These are kidney beans, right?

JAMIE thinks - does he want to tell her this?

JAMIE She's pretending like I'm part of one of those truth groups -

BRIONY What truth groups?

JAMIE Ones that say women don't want us and we don't care -

BRIONY Are you? Part of those?

JAMIE

No.

BRIONY But you know what they say.

JAMIE

Because - everyone kept going on about it. Incel stuff. So I had a look. I didn't really like it.

BRIONY And was that - was you being an incel - was that what she was saying with all of these?

She lays copies of all the emojis on the table. There's the red kidney beans, the dynamite and the 100%, and a bow wrapped heart.

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY Can you explain them all?

JAMIE sits back, looks at her, thinks and then points to the heart.

JAMIE Want love. Won't get it.

Points to the dynamite.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Red pill exploding. Same thing as red pill. And then this is an 80-20 thing.

BRIONY What's an 80-20 thing?

JAMIE 80% of women are attracted to 20% of men. I think they're probably right about that bit. I mean that's just - right.

He sits in that for a moment. BRIONY looks at him carefully.

BRIONY And people liked her comments quite a lot -

JAMIE Yeah. They thought it was funny.

BRIONY You must have found that quite cruel?

JAMIE Yeah. I 'spose.

BRIONY Did she do this to other people too?

JAMIE No. BRIONY Why did she do it to you? JAMIE Cos I'm ugly. Wa-wah. BRIONY You think that's why she did it to you? JAMIE I'm the ugliest I suppose so -BRIONY Did you call her on it? JAMIE Yeah. BRIONY What did you say? JAMIE I don't know. I'm not what you say I am or... BRIONY And what did she say? JAMIE She said "OK" and then smiled and walked away. BRIONY Did you never think to tell anyone else what was she was doing? JAMIE Bit late for that now isn't it? Beat. BRIONY digests this. BRIONY All this. That must have hurt. JAMIE I didn't kill her. BRIONY thinks and then takes an unerring step forward. JAMIE (CONT'D) You think I did because you've seen the video.

But you can't trust video no more. Fake news. Fake news.

BRIONY I'm not here to judge -

JAMIE I didn't kill her. She was a bitch. You can see that. I should have killed her. But I didn't. All I did

BRIONY waits.

JAMIE (CONT'D)

All I did -

BRIONY waits again. JAMIE laughs.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Look at you. All hopeful. Like I'm going to say something important.

BRIONY smiles. But it's a real mask now.

JAMIE (CONT'D) All I did. I did ask her out. After the photo. I went round and said I was sorry and that - that Fidget had done that - shown everyone her ti(ts) chest - and I wanted to know if she'd come up the fair - with me.

There's a silence. BRIONY wants him to continue, but knows not to prompt.

JAMIE (CONT'D) I just thought she might be - weak. At that - I thought she might be weak. So I just thought I'd ask her - if she wanted to go to the fair because everyone else was calling her a slag you know - or flat - or -- so I thought when she was like that - weak - she might - like me.

He looks up at BRIONY. His need and insecurity flooding out of him.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Clever don't you think?

BRIONY To ask her out when everyone else didn't like her?

JAMIE I told her I was sorry they'd done that to her, that Fidget was a wanker, and then I said I'd take her to the fair if she liked.

Beat. He's reliving it.

BRIONY Her weakness - made her more gettable - that was your theory?

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY I thought you said you didn't find her attractive?

JAMIE

She is flat. That's fact. But that's OK. I didn't mind that. I wore my best tracksuit. I don't know why I'm telling you this. And I said - you want to come up the fair?

BRIONY And what did she say?

And this is the worst bit of all for him.

JAMIE

She, uh... Just - laughed. Said she wasn't that desperate.

Beat. He relives that too.

BRIONY

Right.

BRIONY is trying to work out how to navigate this situation.

BRIONY (CONT'D) And the emoji messages came after that?

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY She was - let's say - attacking you for presuming you could ask her out?

*

JAMIE

Your words.

BRIONY You think they're unfair?

JAMIE You think she was a bitch, right? Doing that? You think she was a bullying bitch? She was a bullying bitch, right?

Beat. He's really worked up now.

JAMIE (CONT'D) But there's - that's - the thing, you see - I didn't even - that night - I didn't touch her - I could have touched her - I didn't touch her - I had a knife, she was scared, I could have touched any part of her body I wanted to - I really wanted to - but I didn't - I just -

Beat.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Most boys would have touched her. So that makes me better.

Beat. BRIONY can't look at him for a moment.

JAMIE (CONT'D) That makes me better, don't you think?

BRIONY says nothing.

There's a long silence.

JAMIE picks up and forlornly takes a bite of the sandwich.

BRIONY looks up and watches him do so.

He coughs, on a crumb. He coughs repeatedly.

And then he spits it out, with it a piece of sandwich falls onto the floor.

And then he sits back. We see him piece together everything he just said. Relive it.

JAMIE (CONT'D) No. I didn't mean that. I'm just tired.

Beat.

JAMIE (CONT'D) I'm talking too much and I'm tired.

Beat.

JAMIE (CONT'D) I didn't kill her.

BRIONY Jamie, do you understand what death is?

JAMIE

What?

BRIONY Do you understand what death is?

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY Do you understand that Katie is gone and she can't come back?

JAMIE

I didn't kill her.

BRIONY

That whatever claims you make as to her character $\ensuremath{\mathsf{-}}$

JAMIE I didn't mean she was a bitch.

BRIONY

That whatever claims you make about her, she is gone. That whoever did kill her - that they extinguished the possibility of her future life?

JAMIE

I didn't mean to be mean about her. She wasn't so bad. She just didn't like me. She wasn't so bad otherwise.

BRIONY Do you understand?

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY Do you understand that murder is a crime?

JAMIE I didn't do it.

BRIONY Do you understand it?

JAMIE

Yeah.

BRIONY Do you understand if you are found guilty of that crime you will be held in detention.

JAMIE Who doesn't know that?

BRIONY Do you understand who'll make the decision about that?

JAMIE

Judge. Jury.

BRIONY

OK.

She takes a beat.

BRIONY (CONT'D) OK. Jamie, this is our last session

JAMIE

What? Why?

BRIONY

But what I'd encourage you to do whatever happens next - is take advantage of any mental health services you're offered -

JAMIE

Why?

BRIONY I think you will benefit from talking more about all these things

JAMIE

No.

BRIONY That's what I think.

JAMIE Then you come back. You see me.

BRIONY Unfortunately I'm needed elsewhere.

JAMIE looks up at her, trying to work this out.

JAMIE I can't believe this is just it. Like, fucking, done.

BRIONY I do hope you take what I said seriously. Thanks for your time. I'll ask Frank to come back in now.

JAMIE Thanks for my time?

BRIONY And honesty. I'm grateful you talked to me as honestly as you did.

BRIONY looks up at the camera and makes a 'come in' signal.

JAMIE You think I'm honest? Will you tell the Judge?

BRIONY I think you've spoken to me with honesty but all I'm advising the Judge on is -

JAMIE My understanding.

BRIONY

Yes.

Beat.

JAMIE Doesn't seem like a proper goodbye.

BRIONY

It is.

JAMIE Doesn't seem like one.

FRANK enters the room. JAMIE looks at him, panicked.

JAMIE (CONT'D) We haven't finished.

BRIONY We have. Thanks Frank.

JAMIE

Beat. JAMIE doesn't want her to go.

No.

JAMIE (CONT'D) No. No. Can I ask you something?

BRIONY Of course you can.

JAMIE Do you like me?

Beat. She's really surprised by that question. He's really surprised to have asked it.

There's a silence. He reads her face. His face falls.

JAMIE (CONT'D) Oh. You don't.

BRIONY My job was to assess you, Jamie -

JAMIE Don't you think like that then?

BRIONY I was just here to assess you as a professional -

JAMIE Because I like you. Not like that. Not fancying you. Not really. Just as a person.

FRANK OK son, come on now.

JAMIE Don't you even like me a bit?

BRIONY looks at him.

JAMIE (CONT'D) What did you think? About me then? Decide?

BRIONY This was really useful.

JAMIE I didn't do it so don't go telling people - don't you dare.

Beat.

FRANK

Come on Jamie. I like you enough for everyone. Come on. Let's take you back in your room.

JAMIE is led from the room. He calls back.

JAMIE Don't you even like me a bit? What did you think about me then? Tell my Dad I'm OK. Tell my Dad I'm OK. TELL MY DAD I'M OK.

BRIONY is left.

She stays stock still, trying to control her environment.

The room is spinning but she's not letting it.

She folds the cling film the sandwich was in.

She folds it carefully into a small piece.

She puts it in her bag.

Then she takes it out of her bag and puts it in the empty hot chocolate cup.

She doesn't want a trace of him with her.

She gets up slowly. She looks around, she wobbles just a tiny bit.

She takes a breath.
